








All books placed in the top 20 on the New York Times Bestseller List as of January 26, 2014, and are listed in order of popularity.

### FICTION

1. **The Goldfinch**, by Donna Tartt. A painting smuggled out of the metropolitan Museum of Art after a bombing becomes a boy's prize, guilt and burden. ALL BRANCHES
2. **Sycamore Row**, by John Grisham. A sequel, about race and inheritance, to "A Time to Kill." ALL BRANCHES
3. **The First Phone Call from Heaven**, by Mitch Albom. A small Michigan town is transformed when its residents receive phone calls said to be from heaven. ALL BRANCHES
4. **Command Authority**, by Tom Clancy with Mark Greaney. President Jack Ryan and his son, a covert intelligence expert, try to counter a Russian threat in Tom Clancy's last novel before his death. ALL BRANCHES
5. **Gone Girl**, by Gillian Flynn. A woman disappears on her fifth anniversary; is her husband a killer? ALL BRANCHES
6. **Doctor Sleep**, by Stephen King. Now grown up, Dan, the boy with psycho-intuitive powers in "The Shining," helps another threatened child with a gift. ALL BRANCHES
7. **The Gods of Guilt**, by Michael Connelly. Mickey Haller, a.k.a. the Lincoln lawyer, defends a "digital pimp" accused of murder and confronts an angry daughter. ALL BRANCHES
8. **Cross My Heart**, by James Patterson. Alex Cross's family is threatened by a genius intent on proving that he is the greatest mind in the history of crime. ALL BRANCHES
9. **King and Maxwell**, by David Baldacci. Sean King and Michelle Maxwell, former Secret Service agents turned private investigators, scrutinize the report of a soldier's mysterious death in Afghanistan. ALL BRANCHES
10. **Innocence**, by Dean Koontz. A grotesque man living in exile beneath the city encounters a teenage girl hiding from dangerous enemies. ALL BRANCHES
11. **Takedown Twenty**, by Janet Evanovitch. The New Jersey bounty hunter Stephanie Plum pursues a mobster on the lam. ALL BRANCHES
12. **The Longest Ride**, by Nicholas Sparks. The lives of two couples converge unexpectedly. ALL BRANCHES
13. **Inferno**, by Dan Brown. The symbologist Robert Langdon, on the run in Florence, must decipher a series of codes created by a Dante-loving scientist. ALL BRANCHES
14. **And the Mountains Echoed**, by Khaled Hosseini. A multigenerational family saga centers on a brother and sister born in Afghanistan; from the author of "The Kite Runner." ALL BRANCHES

1. **Things that Matter**, by Charles Krauthammer. Three decades' worth of essays from the conservative columnist. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
2. **David and Goliath**, by Malcolm Gladwell. How disadvantages can work in our favor; from the author of "The Tipping Point" and "Outliers." ALL BRANCHES
3. **Killing Jesus**, by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard. Jesus' life and times, and the events leading up to his execution. ALL BRANCHES
4. **I Am Malala**, by Malala Yousafzai with Christina Lamb. The experience of the Pakistani girl who advocated for women's education and was shot by the Taliban. ALL BRANCHES
5. **George Washington's Secret Six**, by Brian Kilmeade and Don Yaeger. The story of the Culper spy ring, which aided the American cause during the Revolution. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
6. **Lean In**, by Sheryl Sandberg with Nell Scovell. The chief operating officer of Facebook urges women to pursue their careers without ambivalence. ALL BRANCHES
7. **The Bully Pulpit**, by Doris Kearns Goodwin. The author of "Team of Rivals" explores the relationships between Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft and the muckraking press. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW.
8. **Humans of New York**, by Brandon Stanton. Four hundred color photos of New Yorkers, with brief commentary by Stanton. ALL BRANCHES
9. **Unbroken**, by Laura Hillenbrand. An Olympic Runner's story of survival as a prisoner of the Japanese during World War II after his plane went down over the Pacific. ALL BRANCHES
10. **The Boys in the Boat**, by Daniel James Brown. The University of Washington's eight-oar crew and their quest for gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics. GEORGETOWN
11. **Miracles and Massacres**, by Glenn Beck with Kevin Balfe and Hannah Beck. Little-known stories from the American past. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
12. **Zealot**, by Reza Aslan. A biography of Jesus of Nazareth presents him in the context of his times as the leader of a revolutionary movement. ALL BRANCHES
13. **One Summer**, by Bill Bryson. The author of "A Short History of Nearly Everything" describes the events of the summer of 1927: Charles Lindbergh's trans-Atlantic flight, Babe Ruth's 60 homers, the great Mississippi flood. ALL BRANCHES
