Georgetown Library celebrates the season with films for all ages

The Georgetown Library at 405 Cleland Street is offering free holiday movies throughout December, with popcorn included. Mistletoe Mondays are for kids and families, and run from 4 – 6:30 pm. Thursday Classic Christmas Movies feature some tried and true favorites, and run from 6 – 8 pm. Just bring a drink and come get in the holiday spirit!

Mistletoe Mondays

December 7th: “Ice Age: A Mammoth Christmas Special” and “Home Alone”

In “Ice Age,” (animated) Manny, Sid and Diego get in trouble with Santa and have to get their names off of the naughty list. “Home Alone” features an 8-year old troublemaker (Macaulay Culkin) who must protect his home from a pair of burglars when he is accidentally left home alone by his family during Christmas vacation.

December 14th: “How the Grinch Stole Christmas” and “A Christmas Carol”

In the classic, animated version of the Grinch, based on the unforgettable artwork of Dr. Seuss, a grumpy hermit hatches a plan to steal Christmas from the Whos of Whoville. Disney’s animated “A Christmas Carol” features Jim Carrey as a Victorian-era miser taken on a journey of self-redemption, courtesy of several mysterious Christmas apparitions.

December 21st: “The Snowman” and “Polar Express”

“The Snowman” is a short animated adventure about a young English boy who makes a snowman one Christmas Eve, only for it to come to life that night and take him on a magical adventure to the North Pole to meet Santa Claus. “Polar Express” was nominated for three Oscars. A young boy embarks on a magical adventure to the North Pole on the Polar Express. During his adventure he learns about friendship, bravery, and the spirit of Christmas.

Thursday Classic Christmas Movies

December 10th: “White Christmas”

This beloved film stars Bing Crosby, Danny Kaye, Rosemary Clooney and Vera-Allen, and features the songs of Irving Berlin. A successful song-and-dance team become romantically involved with a sister act and team up to save the failing Vermont inn of their former commanding general.

December 17th: “Miracle on 34th Street”

This 1947 classic starring Natalie Wood won 4 Oscars, including best picture. When a nice old man who claims to be Santa Claus is institutionalized as insane, a young lawyer decides to defend him by arguing in court that he is the real thing.
