FICTION

1. **All the Light We Cannot See**, by Anthony Doerr. The lives of a blind French girl and a gadget-obsessed German boy before and during World War II. ALL BRANCHES
2. **The Girl On The Train**, by Paula Hawkins. A psychological thriller set in London is full of complications and betrayals. ALL BRANCHES
3. **Rogue Lawyer**, by John Grisham. The attorney Sebastian Rudd is a “lone gunman” who hates injustice and the system and defends unpopular clients. ALL BRANCHES
4. **See Me**, by Nicholas Sparks. A couple in love are threatened by secrets from the past. ALL BRANCHES
5. **The Bazaar of Bad Dreams**, by Stephen King. Twenty stories, some never before published. ALL BRANCHES
6. **The Nightingale**, by Kristin Hannah. Two sisters in World War II France; one struggling to survive in the countryside, the other joining the Resistance in Paris. ALL BRANCHES
7. **Cross Justice**, by James Patterson. Detective Alex Cross returns to Starkville, N.C., his hometown, for the first time in 35 years, to help a cousin who has been accused of murder. ALL BRANCHES
8. **The Guilty**, by David Baldacci. The government hit man Will Robie investigates murder charges against his estranged father in their Mississippi hometown. ALL BRANCHES
9. **Go Set a Watchman**, by Harper Lee. In the mid-1950s, a grown-up Jean Louise Finch returns home to Macomb to find that her adored father isn't as perfect as she believed. ALL BRANCHES
10. **The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto**, by Mitch Albom. A mystical tale of a guitar genius's journey through 20th-century music. ALL BRANCHES
11. **Tom Clancy: Commander in Chief**, by Mark Greaney. President Jack Ryan detects a pattern in outbreaks of violence around the world that point to the Russian president, but he must unite the Western allies before he can take action. Clancy died in 2013. ALL BRANCHES
12. **Tricky Twenty Two**, by Janet Evanovich. The New Jersey bounty hunter Stephanie Plum pursues a fraternity member arrested for beating up a college dean and investigates a murder. ALL BRANCHES
13. **Fates and Furies**, by Lauren Groff. A marriage viewed from two perspectives. ALL BRANCHES
14. **The Girl in the Spider's Web**, by David Lagercrantz. Mikael Blomkvist and Lisbeth Salander are back in this continuation of Steig Larsson's Millennium series. ALL BRANCHES
15. **A Knight of the Seven Kingdoms**, by George R. R. Martin. A collection of three official prequels to “A Song of Ice and Fire.” ALL BRANCHES

NONFICTION

1. **Between the World and Me**, by Ta-Nehisi Coates. A meditation on race in America as well as a personal story by the national correspondent of The Atlantic, framed as a letter to his teenage son. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
2. **Thomas Jefferson and the Tripoli Pirates**, by Brian Kilmeade and Don Yaeger. The war against the Barbary pirates in 1801. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
3. **Killing Reagan**, by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard. The host of “The O'Reilly Factor” recounts the events surrounding the attempted assassination of President Reagan in 1981. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
4. **Humans of New York: Stories**, by Brandon Stanton. More photographs, this time accompanied by interviews, from the creator of the blog and the book “Humans of New York.” GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
