### FICTION

1. **Rogue Lawyer**, by John Grisham. The attorney Sebastian Rudd is a “lone gunman” who hates injustice and the system and defends unpopular clients. ALL BRANCHES
2. **See Me**, by Nicholas Sparks. A couple in love are threatened by secrets from the past. ALL BRANCHES
3. **All the Light We Cannot See**, by Anthony Doerr. The lives of a blind French girl and a gadget-obsessed German boy before and during World War II. ALL BRANCHES
4. **Career of Evil**, by Robert Galbraith. In the third novel about the private investigative team of Cormoran Strike and Robin Ellacott, the pair pursue a psychotic stalker; by J.K. Rowling, writing pseudonymously. ALL BRANCHES
5. **The Girl On The Train**, by Paula Hawkins. A psychological thriller set in London is full of complications and betrayals. ALL BRANCHES
6. **Depraved Heart**, by Patricia Cornwell. A psychopath sends Dr. Kay Scarpetta videos from the past about her niece in the series’s 23rd book. ALL BRANCHES
7. **Go Set a Watchman**, by Harper Lee. In the mid-1950s, a grown-up Jean Louise Finch returns home to Macomb to find that her adored father isn’t as perfect as she believed. ALL BRANCHES
8. **A Knight of the Seven Kingdoms**, by George R.R. Martin. A collection of three official prequels to “A Song of Ice and Fire.” ALL BRANCHES

1. **Killing Reagan**, by Bill O’Reilly and Martin Dugard. The host of “The O’Reilly Factor” recounts the events surrounding the attempted assassination of President Reagan in 1981. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
