FICTION

1. **Rogue Lawyer**, by John Grisham. The attorney Sebastian Rudd is a “lone gunman” who hates injustice and the system and defends unpopular clients. ALL BRANCHES
2. **The Bazaar of Bad Dreams**, by Stephen King. Twenty stories, some never before published. ALL BRANCHES
3. **The Guilty**, by David Baldacci. The government hit man Will Robie investigates murder charges against his estranged father in their Mississippi hometown. GEORGETOWN ONLY
4. **See Me**, by Nicholas Sparks. A couple in love are threatened by secrets from the past. ALL BRANCHES
5. **Tricky Twenty Two**, by Janet Evanovich. The New Jersey bounty hunter Stephanie Plum pursues a fraternity member arrested for beating up a college dean and investigates a murder. ALL BRANCHES
6. **All the Light We Cannot See**, by Anthony Doerr. The lives of a blind French girl and a gadget-obsessed German boy before and during World War II. ALL BRANCHES
7. **The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto**, by Mitch Albom. A mystical tale of a guitar genius’s journey through 20th-century music. ALL BRANCHES
8. **The Girl On The Train**, by Paula Hawkins. A psychological thriller set in London is full of complications and betrayals. ALL BRANCHES
9. **Go Set a Watchman**, by Harper Lee. In the mid-1950s, a grown-up Jean Louise Finch returns home to Macomb to find that her adored father isn’t as perfect as she believed. ALL BRANCHES
10. **The Crossing**, by Michael Connelly. The retired detective Harry Bosch reluctantly agrees to help his half brother, a defense attorney. ALL BRANCHES
11. **The Nightingale**, by Kristin Hannah. Two sisters in World War II France; one struggling to survive in the countryside, the other joining the Resistance in Paris. ALL BRANCHES
12. **A Knight of the Seven Kingdoms**, by George R.R. Martin. A collection of three official prequels to “A Song of Fire and Ice.” ALL BRANCHES

NONFICTION

1. **Humans of New York: Stories**, by Brandon Stanton. More photographs, this time accompanied by interviews, from the creator of the blog and the book “Humans of New York.” GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
2. **Killing Reagan**, by Bill O’Reilly and Martin Dugard. The host of “The O’Reilly Factor” recounts the events surrounding the attempted assassination of President Reagan in 1981. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
