








All books placed in the top 20 on the New York Times Bestseller List as of June 8, 2014, and are listed in order of popularity.

FICTION

1. **The Goldfinch**, by Donna Tartt. A painting smuggled out of the metropolitan Museum of Art after a bombing becomes a boy's prize, guilt and burden. ALL BRANCHES
2. **Field of Prey**, by John Sandford. Lucas Davenport investigates when multiple bodies are found in the middle of the Minnesota cornfields. ALL BRANCHES
3. **The Invention of Wings**, by Sue Monk Kidd. The relationship between a wealthy Charleston girl, Sarah Grimke, who will grow up to become a prominent abolitionist, and the slave she is given for her 11th birthday. ALL BRANCHES
4. **Chestnut Street**, by Maeve Binchy. Binchy, who died in 2012, depicts ordinary lives in Dublin. ALL BRANCHES
5. **Walking on Water**, by Richard Paul Evans. In the fifth and final book of the "Walk" series, Alan reaches Key West. ALL BRANCHES
6. **The Collector**, by Nora Roberts. A freelance writer who housesits for wealthy clients may have witnessed a murder-suicide. With the dead man's brother, a painter, she travels the world of affluent art collectors seeking to learn what happened; romance ensues. WACCAMAW ONLY
7. **The Husband's Secret**, by Liane Moriarty. A woman's life is upended when she discovers a letter she was not meant to read. ALL BRANCHES
8. **I've Got You Under My Skin**, by Marry Higgins Clark. The producer of a true-crime show must contend with participants with secrets. WACCAMAW ONLY
9. **NYPD Red 2**, by James Patterson and Marshall Karp. Detective Zach Jordan and his partner are called when the body of a wealthy woman is discovered on the Central Park carousel; the second book in a new series. ALL BRANCHES

1. **Capital in the Twenty-First Century**, by Thomas Piketty. A French economist's analysis of centuries of economics history predicts worsening inequality and proposes solutions. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
2. **Thrive**, by Arianna Huffington. Personal well-being as the indispensable third measure—with money and power—of success. GEORGETOWN and WACCAMAW ONLY
3. **Flash Boys**, by Michael Lewis. The world of high-frequency, computer-driven trading. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW

7. **David and Goliath**, by Malcolm Gladwell. How disadvantages can work in our favor; from the author of "The Tipping Point" and "Outliers." ALL BRANCHES
8. **Killing Jesus**, by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard. Jesus' life and times, and the events leading up to his execution. ALL BRANCHES
9. **10% Happier**, by Dan Harris. A co-anchor of "Nightline" reports on the science and spiritual basis of meditation and describes how it has improved his life. GEORGETOWN and WACCAMAW ONLY
10. **I Am Malala**, by Malala Yousafzai with Christina Lamb. The experience of the Pakistani girl who advocated for women's education and was shot by the Taliban. ALL BRANCHES
