





All books placed in the top 16 on the New York Times Bestseller List as of July 10, 2016, and are listed in order of popularity.

We have four library branches, and not all books are at all four. A listing of branches that carry each book appears at the end of the description.




1. **The Girl On The Train**, by Paula Hawkins. A psychological thriller set in London is full of complications and betrayals. ALL BRANCHES




