





All books placed in the top 16 on the New York Times Bestseller List as of July 24, 2016, and are listed in order of popularity.

We have four library branches, and not all books are at all four. A listing of branches that carry each book appears at the end of the description.




1. **End of Watch**, by Stephen King. The conclusion of the Bill Hodges trilogy. ALL BRANCHES



2. **The Girl On The Train**, by Paula Hawkins. A psychological thriller set in London is full of complications and betrayals. ALL BRANCHES








5. **Before the Fall**, by Noah Hawley. After a private jet crashes, a firestorm of media madness ensues. ALL BRANCHES









1. **Hamilton: The Revolution**, by Lin-Manuel Miranda and Jeremy McCarter. The libretto of the Grammy– and Pulitzer Prize-winning musical, annotated by its creator, along with backstage photos, a production history and interviews with the cast. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW

2. **When Breath Becomes Air**, by Paul Kalanithi. A memoir of a physician who received a diagnosis of Stage IV lung cancer at the age of 36. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW
