




All books placed in the top 20 on the New York Times Bestseller List as of August 10, 2014, and are listed in order of popularity.

We have four library branches, and not all books are at all four. A listing of branches that carry each book appears at the end of the description.







9. **The Husband's Secret**, by Liane Moriarty. A woman's life is upended when she discovers a letter she was not meant to read. ALL BRANCHES




10. **All Fall Down**, by Jennifer Weiner. A woman becomes addicted to pain medication. ALL BRANCHES




**NONFICTION**



1. **Unbroken**, by Laura Hillenbrand. An Olympic Runner's story of survival as a prisoner of the Japanese during World War II after his plane went down over the Pacific. ALL BRANCHES



2. **Blood Feud**, by Edward Klein. A journalist describes animosity behind the alliance between the Clinton and Obama families. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW



3. **One Nation**, by Ben Carson with Candy Carson. Carson, a retired pediatric neurosurgeon, now a Fox News contributor, offers solutions to problems in health and education based on capitalism, not government. GEORGETOWN, WACCAMAW

4. **Hard Choices**, by Hillary Rodham Clinton. Clinton's memoir focuses on her years as secretary of state and her views about the American role in the world. WACCAMAW ONLY
